Hello Joann, OSHA is currently working on updating the COVID-19 page. However, below is the criteria to use for determining whether you have an OSHA recordable COVID-19 case. Thanks - Valerie

COVID-19 is a recordable illness. Employers are responsible for recording cases of **COVID-19** if all of the following are met:

The case is a confirmed case of COVID-19 illness as defined by CDC.

The case is work-related as defined by 1904.5, and

The case involves one or more of the general recording criteria set forth in 1904.7 (e.g. medical treatment beyond first aid, days away from work).
